Events over the Summer

Tuesday 20th May 2014

FrANC's contribution to Bristol Walking Festival month saw us hosting a Medicinal Herb Walk on a section of The Cut. This was attended by 30 people, comprising some FrANC members and others who had heard about us through the publicity of the Walking Festival. We were all captivated by the knowledge of medicinal herbalist Iain Stewart. The plethora of herbs in the small area of Gaol Ferry Bridge and adjacent churchyard meant that 'walk' was a bit of an overstatement as we probably only travelled a few hundred yards! Nevertheless, the event feedback forms (in use for the first time at FrANC) confirmed that everyone had found the topic interesting, the event had lasted the 'right length of time' and that the use of our newly-acquired portable voice amplifier had ensured that everyone could hear the speaker well.

Treasure Island aboard the *Matthew* – Sunday 22nd June 2014

Geological Walk – Wednesday evening 9th July 2014

We agreed at the AGM that we'd like to have one event each year identified as a 'John Purkiss Memorial Event' and the Geological Walk booked for the above date has been identified as such for 2014. This topic is a first for FrANC and we hope to see many of you there. We will send an e-mail with details of start time and meeting point nearer the date. There will be a charge of £2 per person to help cover costs.

Walks around The Cut

We have again been able to respond to several requests for guided walks around The Cut. It is always a great privilege to show off the area and tell people a little about its wildlife and history. Those participating often have their own stories to add – which bring a unique quality to each occasion.

Rubbish!

Three more successful litter picks have been completed this year and the battle goes on. When we undertook our third session in early March opposite ASDA, they were good enough to offer us their hospitality room afterwards where we enjoyed our usual tea/coffee and cakes after two hours of hard but satisfying work. Over the three sessions we estimate that collectively we undertook around 120 hours of litter picking. It was also great to have some young people join us at one event.....we are conscious that for FrANC to flourish we need some young members as well as relying on those of us who have been around a while!

We had very much hoped to report on progress regarding the removal of bulk rubbish behind the garage on Coronation Road and on the bank along York Road where there are large items including sofas, fridges, etc. Despite Bristol City Council (BCC) providing the finances and getting an undertaking from May Gurney early last summer to tackle the work this spring, May Gurney ultimately let us down – by saying there were Health and Safety issues, etc. The Committee is in consultation with the Docks Estates Manager, Eric Dougall, who has been helpful but we haven't yet found a solution. If you have any ideas please let us know; we will now be waiting for the undergrowth to die down before it is worth progressing – probably next January/February. BCC also has enough money put aside to remove the scaffolding that is stuck in the mud in the centre of The Cut.

Thank you to those FrANC members who have undertaken some impromptu litter picking prior to events – to ensure The Cut is at its best. We are grateful to the Waste Disposal teams for their help in collecting this rubbish when we have alerted them.

MetroBus update

The MetroBus preferred route has been confirmed as along Cumberland Road, after crossing The Cut by Butterfly Junction. We continue to be concerned about the impact on this area, especially during construction and will be proactive in promoting the preservation of the wildlife, flora and fauna throughout the project.

Our tree is flourishing


Wild City

The Wild City Project has now come to a close. FrANC wishes to acknowledge Wild City input in its final year towards:

- completion of the 5-year Management Plan for The Cut;
- the planned Local Nature Reserve status for the New Cut;
- the refurbishment of three Interpretation Boards;
- the purchase of two portable voice amplifiers.
